Course title: Italian Intermediate B1.2 – 5 week extension

Course dates:

28th April, 5th May, 9th June, 23rd June, 30th June
2026 (18:30-20:30)

Course descriptor/objectives

This is an extension course for learners who have completed our Italian Intermediate B1.2 course and wish to consolidate what has been learnt.

The aim of the course is to help the learner to become an independent user of the target language and to develop their communication skills for social and professional purposes. Therefore, by the end of the course participants will be able to:

- understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc.
- deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling in an area where the language is spoken.
- produce simple connected text on topics which are familiar or of personal interest
- describe experiences and events, dreams, hopes & ambitions and briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.

Participants will further develop reading, listening, speaking and writing skills through a series of task-oriented sessions and will be provided with informal formative feedback during contact hours. The completion level of the course is broadly equivalent

to the *B1.2* level of the Common European Framework.

In seminars, participants will have to engage in practical exercises and group interaction in order to develop relevant language-specific learning strategies. The role of the instructor is to facilitate this process, to provide useful tools and to encourage participants to become independent learners and basic users of the languages too.

Language-specific information:

Italian is spoken by around 85 million people worldwide, with approximately 67 million native speakers in Europe, making it one of the most widely spoken national languages in the EU. It is an official language in Italy, Switzerland, San Marino, and the Vatican, and there are significant Italian-speaking communities in many other countries, including the United States. The British Council has also identified Italian as one of the ten most important languages for the UK in its *Languages for the Future* report.

Italian is strongly associated with rich cultural traditions in art, music, and cuisine, and many Italian terms have become part of international vocabularies through these fields.

Derived from the Latin of the Roman Empire, Italian retains many linguistic features that reflect this heritage. Historically, varieties of Italian used by medieval trading powers also served as an important lingua franca across the Mediterranean, leaving a lasting influence and contributing loanwords that persist today.

Prerequisite:

This non-credit bearing weekly course is intended for language learners who have completed an Italian Intermediate B1.2 course or equivalent.

Coursebook and/or learning resources:

Materials will be supplied by the teacher.
