Course title: Japanese Upper-Intermediate – Part 4

Course descriptor/objectives

The aim of the course is to further develop learners' Japanese reading, listening, written and oral skills at upper-intermediate level (JLPT N4, progressing towards N3 in communicative competence) for effective communication. Therefore, by the end of the course participants will be able to:

- understand the main ideas of complex Japanese texts on both concrete and abstract topics, including selected authentic materials;
- interact with a high degree of spontaneity and fluency, enabling sustained interaction with native speakers in a range of contexts;
- discuss a wide range of topics and express, justify and develop their own opinions, responding appropriately to others;
- produce clear and coherent spoken and written Japanese, making effective use of an expanded range of grammatical structures and vocabulary.

Participants will further develop reading, listening, speaking and writing skills through a series of task-oriented and communicative sessions, with increasing emphasis on extended discourse, accuracy and flexibility. Informal formative feedback will be provided during contact hours.

In seminars, participants will engage in practical exercises and group interaction designed to develop independent language use, strategic competence and confidence in more complex communicative situations. The role of the instructor is to facilitate this process, provide targeted guidance and encourage participants to become autonomous users of the language.

Language-specific information:

There are around 124,000,000 native speakers of Japanese and it is the national language of Japan. As a language isolate, Japanese syntax and phonology is very different from other languages. No other country uses Japanese as a first language, although there are many Japanese communities across the world.

The writing system makes use of two syllabaries: Hiragana for pure Japanese words and Katakana for borrowed words. Both syllabaries are used together with Kanji, which is composed of characters from Chinese. The written language is also closely tied to iconic elements of Japanese culture such as manga and possibly the first ever novel: The Tale of the Genji.

Prerequisite:

You should have completed our upper-intermediate course part 3 course or equivalent, and be working at JLPT N4/N3 level, with the ability to use core intermediate structures confidently and some familiarity with more advanced patterns. These include, for example:

Completion of any Japanese beginner textbooks

e.g., げんき、みんなの日本語 etc.

- Making hypothetical statements ～たら
- Expressing natural/habitual results ～と
- Nominalising clauses ～の
- Giving multiple reasons ～し
