Course title: Introduction to Ancient Greek part II – online

Course descriptor/objectives

This is a part II introductory course. By the end of the course participants will be able to:

- i. Understand basic grammar of Ancient Greek along with participles and translations of short passages.
- ii. Have an appreciation of 5th century Athenian culture and history, realizing the contribution made by ancient Greeks to today's world.

Participants will learn the Greek alphabet, develop some basic reading and writing skills; gain knowledge of core grammar and specifically, the intricacies of syntax in Ancient Greek, learn English words derived from Ancient Greek; discuss aspects of life in Ancient Greece, such as slavery, roles of women, farming and public life.

In seminars, participants will have to engage in practical exercises and group interaction in order to develop relevant language-specific learning strategies. The role of the instructor is to facilitate this process, provide useful tools and encourage participants to become independent learners and basic users of the languages too.

Language-specific information:

The Ancient Greek language includes the forms of Greek used in ancient Greece and the ancient world from around 1500 BC to 300 BC. It was the languages of Homer and Athenian historians, playwrights, and philosophers. Ancient Greek has contributed many words to English and other

languages and has been a standard subject of study in educational institutions of the Western World since the renaissance. In modern times, Ancient Greek has influenced the naming of technical terms in many European languages, and it's possible to find modern works translated into Ancient Greek, including some volumes of *Asterix* and even *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone!**
