



Evening language programme 2023/24

Course title: Mandarin Chinese -Upper Intermediate HSK 4 – from Lesson 2

Course descriptor/objectives

The aim of the course is to help the learner to develop Mandarin Chinese reading, listening, written and oral skills at upper-intermediate level and for communication purposes. Therefore, by the end of the course participants will be able to:

- understand the main ideas of complex Chinese text on both concrete and abstract topics.
- 2. interact with a degree of spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible without strain for either party.
- produce clear, detailed text on a wide range of subjects and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options.

This non-credit bearing weekly course is intended for language learners who have completed an Intermediate part II course and wish to improve their Mandarin Chinese language skills. Participants will further develop reading, listening, speaking and writing skills through a series of task-oriented sessions and will be provided with informal formative feedback during contact hours.

In seminars, participants will have to engage in practical exercises and group interaction in order to develop relevant language-specific learning strategies. The role of the instructor is to facilitate this process, provide useful tools and encourage participants to become independent learners and basic users of the languages too.

Language-specific information:

Mandarin Chinese boasts an incredible 1,085,000,000 speakers within China, though it is also spoken around the world. It is the second most spoken language in the world, but the first in terms of native speakers. As the main language used in China, it acts as a lingua franca for people across the Chinese provinces.

As a tonal language, very similar words in Mandarin can be differentiated through the use of specific tones. Mandarin Chinese has four tones: level, rising, departing and final. These tones can often seem daunting to new learners, but can be mastered with careful practice.

Prerequisite:

This non-credit bearing weekly course is intended for Mandarin Chinese learners, who have completed HSK4, Lesson 1. The course will start from Lesson 2.

Technical requirements:
